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Lubbock leaders turn dirt for freeway project

ocal dignitaries turned the first shovel of dirt recently on the long-awaited Marsha Sharp Freeway project. Groundbreaking ceremonies took place in May at West Loop 289 and the Brownfield Highway, the location of the first construction project.

City and county officials, Texas Tech University and the Chamber of Commerce joined the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to kick off the \$46.5 million project, the first of four construction phases. Granite Construction, Inc. was awarded the bid in December.

Said Mayor Marc McDougal, "I think everyone is excited to get this long-awaited transportation project off the ground, and I feel it is most appropriate that the freeway is named after an individual of Marsha's stature."

The Lubbock City Council passed an ordinance in October of 2000 officially naming the freeway. The highway is named the Marsha Sharp Freeway in honor of the Texas Tech University Lady Raider's basketball coach who led the women's team to a national championship in 1993.

Granite sets barricades on freeway project

ranite Construction, Inc. employees are building detours and setting barricades in preparation for construction on the first phase of the Marsha Sharp Freeway.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) kicked off the \$46.5 million construction project at a recent groundbreaking. This is the first of four phases for the \$256 million freeway scheduled for completion sometime after 2010.

The first phase includes widening the West Loop from four to six lanes from 34th Street to Slide Rd., constructing the 50th Street overpass, widening frontage roads on the West Loop from 34th Street to Slide Road, and building frontage roads along US 62/82 from Chicago Avenue to a point about one half mile outside the loop.

Contractors started work recently at 34th Street and West Loop 289. Work during the first eleven months includes building the 34th Street turnarounds and widening frontage roads on the West Loop.

In addition to setting barricades, contractors are also building a detour on the Loop main lanes from north of 34th Street to south of 34th in preparation for widening the 34th Street bridge. Traffic will be detoured from the southbound to the northbound lanes for the first few months. Contractors are also working on the Spur 327 bridge that will connect the Loop frontage road from north of the Spur to Slide Road.

The public should expect lane closures and detours for the next two and a half years. Motorists are encouraged to find an alternate route.
