


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

## Study Description and Background

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is conducting a study to develop a Corridor Master Plan for a 142-mile stretch of the United States (US) 67 corridor. The study limits along the US 67 corridor stretch from Interstate Highway 10 (I-10) west of Fort Stockton to the Presidio-Ojinaga Port of Entry on the U.S./Mexico border. US 67 provides access to the towns of Alpine, Marfa, Presidio, and surrounding communities, and passes through Pecos, Brewster, and Presidio counties. See **Figure 1** for a study location map.

## Study Goal

The US 67 study corridor has experienced growth driven by many factors, including population growth, increased tourism and special events, international commerce, and Permian Basin oil field development. This has led to a number of transportation issues. According to the TxDOT Crash Records Information System (CRIS) database, from 2010 to 2018 there were 878 crashes along the corridor, including 135 severe injury crashes and 12 fatal crashes. The crash rates along the majority

of the study corridor exceed the statewide average for similar classes of roadway. One of the goals of the study and the US 67 Corridor Master Plan is to identify and document current and future transportation needs along the US 67 study corridor. The study will include comprehensive data collection, corridor planning, development strategies, feasibility analysis, and public involvement, in order to recommend a set of improvement projects for short-, mid-, and long-term implementation.

## Purpose of the Public Involvement Plan

The Consultant Team (including CDM Smith, Blanton & Associates, Inc. [B&A], CONSOR, and Kleinman Consultants, P.L.L.C. [Kleinman]) will assist TxDOT in developing strategies and tools that create public awareness of the study and achieve meaningful public input regarding corridor needs and concerns. The Consultant Team will implement these strategies and tools throughout the course of the study. The public involvement program will be tailored to suit the concerns, impacts, and communication style in the corridor, and will be consistent with federal and statewide planning regulations. It will be a “collaborative process” that is initiated early and will be proactive and continuous throughout the study.

The primary purpose of the Public Involvement Plan (PIP) is to ensure public awareness of the study and to encourage public input into the corridor development process. Because past TxDOT and pipeline projects in the area were not well received by the public, building good relationships with the public and affected stakeholders is of the utmost importance and would hopefully result in increased transparency, level of trust, and confidence in TxDOT’s planning process and with the study outcomes. To meet this goal, and because the US 67 Corridor Master Plan is a detailed planning study scoped to include short-, mid-, and long-term recommended solutions, the Consultant Team referenced the 2008 *FHWA Planning and Environmental Linkages Implementation Resource Guide* to ensure that a similar robust planning and outreach process was followed. A Planning and Environmental Linkage (PEL) study, or PEL study, represents an approach that fosters a collaborative and integrated transportation decision-making process. A PEL study is generally executed early in the transportation planning process when decision-makers consider environmental, community, and economic goals and carry these goals through to the project development and environmental review process, and ultimately through design, construction, and maintenance. The goal of a PEL study is to create a seamless decision-making process that minimizes duplication of effort, promotes environmental stewardship, and reduces delay from planning through project implementation.

Similar to the US 67 Master Plan Corridor Study, PEL studies are generally more focused than a regional planning effort, but broader than a traditional project-specific environmental analyses typically conducted during the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process. Also, PEL studies can be used to produce a wide range of analyses or decisions for FHWA review, consideration, and possible adoption during the NEPA process for an individual transportation project, including:

- Purpose and need or goals and objective statement(s);
- General travel corridor and/or general mode(s) definition;
- Preliminary screening of alternatives and elimination of unreasonable alternatives;
- Basic description of the environmental setting; and/or
- Preliminary identification of environmental impacts and environmental mitigation.

In addition, a PEL study would also meet criteria identified in the 2011 *Federal Highway Administration Planning and Environmental Linkages Questionnaire*. The US 67 PIP was developed to meet similar criteria in an effort to inform the community and to obtain meaningful feedback and results. At the direction of TxDOT, the Consultant Team will develop and update this PIP to outline specific dates for each task to be implemented and establish approval and communication protocols. This PIP also will serve as the reference/guidebook that assists the process of developing and implementing an effective public involvement program for the US 67 corridor study, using a framework similar to PEL studies.

## Public Involvement Objectives

The following is a list of public involvement objectives that will be implemented as part of the study:

- **Provide early and ongoing public involvement to engage all appropriate stakeholders and the general community** – TxDOT and the Consultant Team will continue to inform the public of the proposed study throughout the duration of study activities by providing updates to the media, both through traditional outlets, such as newspapers, and through online channels, such as utilizing MindMixer (<https://www.mindmixer.com/>) by mySidewalk, Inc., data sharing utilizing Viewpro (<http://maps.viewprogis.com/vp/us67>), distributing newsletters, and through workshops and various meetings.
- **Distribute consistent and reliable information about the study** – TxDOT and the Consultant Team will seek to provide the most up to date information about the study to the public through the methods listed above.
- **Establish and maintain effective two-way communication between the community and TxDOT** – The public involvement process for the US 67 Corridor Master Plan will emphasize two-way communication between the community and TxDOT and strive to maintain proactive communication and information dissemination during this process. This will help ensure the community is informed and know where to go or who to speak to, should they have any questions or concerns. TxDOT and the Consultant Team will provide reasonable public access to educational, technical, and policy information to enhance the public’s knowledge and ability to participate in the development of the study. TxDOT and the Consultant Team will provide a variety of methods to access study information, including websites, media blasts (radio, newspapers, and television), and availability of hard copy information at public gathering places, such as libraries and the TxDOT Alpine Area Office.

- **Collaborate with community on study needs and priorities** – This public outreach effort will include working directly with the public to identify the needs and priorities for future improvements to the US 67 study corridor.
- **Collaborate with community on potential solutions** – This public outreach effort will work directly with the community to identify potential options for the proposed project recommendations.
- **Consider and incorporate public input during the decision-making process** – TxDOT and the Consultant Team will consider public input in the decision-making process and will keep the public informed about study developments and conceptual design modifications.

## Focus Groups (a.k.a. Stakeholders)

Various Focus Groups will be created from the US 67 Corridor Master Plan Contact List (**Attachment A**) and/or from property owners and special interest groups, as needed. Focus Group meetings will be held throughout the study. The following Focus Groups could be created: public officials, ranch or large landowners, environmental groups, bicyclist special interest groups, etc. Input from the Corridor Working Group will assist in determining who to include in focus groups. Materials and notes from the various Focus Group meetings will be included in **Attachment B**.

## Steering Committee

A Steering Committee list will be created from the US 67 Corridor Master Plan Contact List (**Attachment A**). The Steering Committee may include judges, mayors and city officials who provide direction in identification of the study area concerns and development of the corridor master plan.

## Corridor Working Group (a.k.a. Agency Working Group)

A Corridor Working Group (CWG) list will be created from the US 67 Corridor Master Plan Contact List (**Attachment A**). The CWG will include agency representatives, focus group members, and public officials who may provide insight into the study area and concerns. This list will be updated as the study moves forward through input from TxDOT, the Consultant Team, public officials, and local organizations.

## Public Involvement Strategies

The following is a list of public involvement strategies that will be implemented as part of the study:

1. Ensure the public is well informed of the study through the public involvement activities detailed below
2. In order to collect valuable information on the corridor, interviews will be conducted with public officials and focus group members before the first public meeting and afterwards, as needed

3. Maintain transparency and keep the public updated throughout the decision-making process
4. Hold CWG meetings to provide information to and gather input from strategic groups with an interest in the study area
5. Hold study coordination meetings, including meetings with individual focus groups (up to 15 meetings), meetings with affected property owners (MAPOs), if applicable, and/or meetings with neighborhood or community groups
6. Provide presentations and updates, as needed or upon request, to city councils, county commissioners, or other special interest groups
7. Hold CWG meetings at various locations throughout the corridor (up to 7 meetings)
8. Hold three series of public meetings at various locations throughout the corridor (up to 12 meetings)
9. Share data through online data management tool (e.g. Viewpro)
10. Obtain feedback from the public and focus groups through various means, such as comment forms, surveys, interviews, and online portals (e.g., MindMixer)
11. Work with CWG to ensure comments are considered
12. Show how comments were considered in subsequent meetings

## Public Involvement Activities

Provided below is a list of public involvement activities that were utilized in obtaining input from focus groups and the public:

- Establish methods for focus groups, the public, and other interested parties to contact the Consultant Team, such as providing contact information (e.g. contact names, numbers, and emails) at each meeting, and providing contact information and an email link on the website. All contact with the public by the Consultant Team will be noted and included in study documentation.
- Prepare database/ mailing list including names and contact information for entities such as CWG members, focus groups, public officials, local governments, emergency responders, civic leaders, and those who have indicated an interest in the study, such as members of the public. The database will be updated as needed and will serve as the study mailing list. Key members of this list will be interviewed early in the study, and the information gathered will be used to enhance the initial PIP.
- Provide electronic files of correspondence to TxDOT along with an electronic file containing the names of elected officials from which a mail merge and mailing labels can be created.
- Assist TxDOT in preparing a study webpage that will include:<sup>1</sup>
  - Study overview

- Study maps
  - Public involvement materials, such as virtual open house links, copies of newsletters, notices, invitation letters, and meeting summaries
  - Calendar of dates for key public outreach activities
  - Consultant Team contact information
- Prepare and distribute study newsletters to inform the community about the study, including compiling and maintaining a mailing list. The newsletters will be updated as needed to keep the public up to date and well informed about the status of the study. The newsletters will be prepared in two languages (English and Spanish) at various milestones throughout the study (see Estimated Timeline). Newsletters will be sent electronically to all members of the database, and an appropriate number of paper copies will be provided to CWG members for their personal distribution. The Consultant Team will provide materials for approval, make changes, coordinate production and arrange for mailing copies to names listed on the database. In addition, the newsletters will be posted on the study website and hard copies will be available at public gathering places, such as libraries and the TxDOT Alpine Area Office. (Up to 3 newsletter editions)
  - Utilize TxDOT templates and Master Plan branding to create PowerPoint presentations for use at public meetings, small group meetings, or discussions with elected officials. (Up to 8 times)
  - Create “Meetings in a Box” (including PowerPoint presentation and accompanying script) to be updated for each quarter or public meeting to be used for meeting requests. (Up to 8 times)
  - Conduct public, elected official, and focus group interviews early in the process. These interviews will be designed to build rapport, learn individual perspectives, and bring out viable solutions or ideas. The results of these interviews will be used to prepare draft correspondence to the public and elected officials at the direction of TxDOT, and to guide public involvement throughout the master plan process. A list of Focus Group Interview Questions is provided in **Attachment B**. This list will be updated as the study moves forward.
  - Create updates for the media that explain the study and its status. Media blasts will be disseminated by the District Public Involvement Officer (PIO) to stations such as, but not limited to: *KRTS-Marfa Public Radio, Alpine Radio (KVLF & KALP), KWES NewsWest9, KOSA-TV CBS 7, and KPEJ Fox 24.*
  - Prepare easy to understand conceptual drawings and graphic documents for public distribution and online posting. Where applicable, the Consultant Team will prepare interactive maps to provide additional information to the public.
  - Utilize MindMixer by mySidewalk, Inc. as an online engagement tool to facilitate discussions between the public and the Consultant Team. This forum will allow communities to weigh in on various topics throughout the corridor study, as well as to share ideas, photographs, and visualize the study corridor through interactive maps.
  - Conduct CWG meetings composed of representatives from cities, counties, agencies, and community groups. The CWG meetings will provide updates on study developments to key

community members and representatives and will provide a forum for receiving input on the study and information about the study area. The CWG will serve as a conduit for distributing study information and updates to the community at large. The Consultant Team will assist in the planning of, preparation of, and conducting the meetings to afford opportunities to meet and engage focus groups, such as trucking associations, brokers and agents, local chambers of commerce and economic development groups, ports of entry, and other groups. (Up to 8 meetings)

- Arrange for CWG meeting locations, coordinate logistics, prepare notices (for department distribution), and attend and summarize meetings. Various materials (fact sheet, handouts, comment cards, brochure, etc.) will be prepared in both English and Spanish.
- Conduct study coordination meetings with individual and community focus groups and schedule on a case-by-case basis. Based on input from the groups, these meetings may be held on weekends or in the evening in order to accommodate work schedules and ensure that those who are interested may attend. (Up to 15 meetings)
- Conduct public meetings to provide an opportunity for the public to learn about the study, ask questions, receive answers, and give input. Notification may take place via the following:
  - Media releases – will be drafted and disseminated by the District PIO prior to public meetings, and as needed.
  - Notification Flyers – The Consultant Team will draft and distribute English and Spanish Flyers at least two weeks prior to the meetings to various businesses, places of worship, Chambers of Commerce, schools and other public places.
  - Email blasts – Emails may be sent to available focus group email addresses notifying/reminding them of meetings 7 to 10 days prior to the meeting. The District PIO will also send email blasts, as appropriate.
  - Social media – Meeting reminders may be provided via TxDOT Twitter or Facebook accounts 7 to 10 days prior to the meetings.
  - Web postings – Public meeting notices will be posted on the Hearings and Meetings Schedule web page and the study web page approximately two weeks prior, and public meeting information will be posted to the study web site within five days after the public meeting is held. This will include a virtual public meeting link for members of the public who are not able to attend in person. The virtual public meeting will contain all exhibits, presentations, and handouts that were provided in person.
  - Newspaper advertisements – Ads will be developed and placed in the *Big Bend Sentinel*, *The International*, the *Alpine Avalanche*, *Fort Stockton Pioneer*, and the *Jeff Davis County Mountain Dispatch* at least two weeks prior to the meetings.
- Brain Dump Workshop – The concept of the Brain Dump Workshop is for everyone to share their ideas and also to react to others’ ideas. The Consultant Team will set up on an online portal where residents, business owners, and other focus groups can collaborate with peers. The participants will be presented with a series of topics on which they can provide their ideas

and feedback. The portal will provide TxDOT and Consultant Team with a summary of survey responses and the Consultant Team will keep participants posted on the impact of their ideas and opinions.

- Online Platform – Participants will create an account in this portal and can be engaged throughout the study process. This will be an effective way to communicate with the public at large and provide an opportunity for residents to discuss differing viewpoints. The Consultant Team will facilitate the discussion; which could be particularly effective when concerns of users with distinct outlooks and needs are presented that the general public may not be fully aware of. These online activities can also be planned as inner round table discussions to reach a wider audience. Hard copy handouts will be provided in case there is no online platform available.
- In-Person Workshop – Four workshops will be developed with community officials and leaders to kick-off the brain dump process using the electronic tool (**Attachment C**). The online portal will be demonstrated and the engineering process will be explained in the introduction of the in-person workshops. Initial focus group meetings will include discussion of the brain dump to encourage participation by all groups.
- Facilitation – Consultant Team and TxDOT staff will act as facilitators available to all teams to both ask and answer questions during the team discussions to provoke thought and concept evaluation among team members. TxDOT and the Consultant Team will not make final concept suggestions or influence team recommendations.
- Bus Tours – A total of up to three, one-day bus or van tours of the study corridor will be held with study focus groups, elected officials, and/or local communities to discuss specific issues/concerns that may affect the respective focus group/community and to obtain input on current and future planning efforts along the corridor. The Consultant Team will rent one bus per tour along with the driver and insurance and provide appropriate informational materials.
- Focus Group relations – Consultant Team members will respond to inquiries on a case-by-case basis. Only the TxDOT Project Manager or TxDOT Alpine Area Engineer will respond to elected officials.
- Media relations – Consultant Team members will not respond to media inquiries. Instead, they will provide the reporter with the name and contact information for the TxDOT District PIO, TxDOT Project Manager, or TxDOT Alpine Area Engineer. In addition, the Consultant Team will assist in preparing media releases and forward to the department for review and subsequent distribution. Media releases will announce public meetings and provide news about study progress.
- The Consultant Team will provide Spanish translation services, as necessary, including translation of newsletters and presentation materials.

- Visualizations – The Consultant Team will provide visualizations to assist in the public involvement effort and agency coordination. These visualizations may include the following components:
  - Mixed Virtual Reality – The Consultant Team will incorporate the HoloLens technology to provide a fully immersive experience using interactive virtual reality and mixed reality to further enhance the information provided to the general public.
  - 3-D HoloLens model demonstrations at five locations (with alternatives) will be presented at the last public meeting series to allow the public to experience and provide comments on the alternatives. This visualization will include a combination of aerial mapping, annotated graphics, and design features to convey corridor alternatives, constraints, and key features.
  - 3-D flyover videos will be presented using Infracore® model for existing conditions for the entire corridor, and at five locations showing the future recommended alternative at each of those locations.

## Media Request Protocol

The media will seek information from multiple sources. These potentially include TxDOT, Consultant Team members, neighborhoods, businesses, or other stakeholders within the corridor. Consultant Team members will not respond to media inquiries. Media requests for information to the Consultant Team must be directed immediately to the TxDOT District PIO (Jennifer Wright), TxDOT Project Manager (Rebecca Reyes), or the TxDOT Alpine Area Engineer (Christopher Weber). Christopher Weber and/or Jennifer Wright are the designated spokespersons for media inquiries unless that protocol is modified by TxDOT.

## Approval Process for Communications Products

Any communication product (e.g. fact sheet, newsletter) created by district staff and/or a consultant may go through the following approval process:

- Consultant Team QA/QC review
- TxDOT review
- Concurrent review by TxDOT Transportation Planning and Programming Division – Public Involvement (TPP/PI) Section as determined by TxDOT Project Manager (Rebecca Reyes)

## Evaluation Methods for Public Involvement Effort

To evaluate this public involvement effort, various strategies may be tracked, measured, and evaluated. These strategies include:

- Number of CWG meetings, study coordination meetings, interviews, public meetings conducted, as well as number of attendees at each event
- Number of informational materials (fact sheets, etc.) distributed
- Evaluation of how public comments were used in the decision-making process

An Evaluation Survey will be created to gather input from the public on how they think the study is going, how TxDOT and the Consultant Team is doing, and if they think the public's input is being taken into consideration as part of the study. A copy of the evaluation can be found in **Attachment D**.

#### *Follow-up to Evaluation Survey*

The evaluation form was presented to the CWG members at CWG Meeting #5 and to the public during Public Meeting Series #3. Generally, the CWG and the public agreed that the purpose of the study was clear and that their time was well spent by attending meetings. The public agreed that their input would have an effect on the final recommendations and strongly agreed that the Consultant Team was receptive to input and new ideas and would present recommendations that are best for the community. Overall, the CWG and public indicated that they are satisfied with the public involvement effort and the study.

### **Documentation of Public Involvement Activities**

The Consultant Team will gather written comments and feedback after the meetings and provide an overall summary of all public involvement activities. Additionally, the Consultant Team will document the public involvement activities by collecting copies of all letters, email correspondence, and direct communications with members of the interested public.

The Consultant Team will prepare and maintain a communications log to document inquiries from the public and elected officials. This log will be updated regularly, documenting the nature of the comment, inquiry, or request, tracking the appropriate means to follow-up with the individual or group, and the resolution performed by TxDOT and/or the Consultant Team. The Master Communications Log is provided in **Attachment E**. This log will be updated and maintained as the study moves forward.

### **Conclusion**

This PIP outlines the public outreach efforts for the US 67 Corridor Master Plan study and may be modified as the public involvement efforts evolve. If the plan is modified, all members of the Consultant Team will be notified and updated about the proposed changes. Throughout the study, the Consultant Team will continually consider the goals, strategies, and audiences of this study as outlined in the PIP.

*Reminder: This PIP is a living document that is subject to change, based on TxDOT input and public needs. The plan may be modified or updated to address changing study objectives, focus group needs, strategies or methods to adapt to new and changing circumstances as the study progresses.*





## Alternatives at Intersection 1: US 67 and BU 67


1. Will improvements here be needed given that this road itself will be all one way AFTER BRIDGE is in place? Ask TxDOT to provide plans for this section, related to new bridge.
2. Look into drainage issues cause by US 67 and impacting city streets. At UETA area. The retention pond there doesn't work. Water is diverted to city street (Lovett, I believe). Always a issue when it rains. Stormwater isn't retained..it bypasses the pond there.

## Alternatives for Intersection 2: Harrington St, Bledsoe Blvd & US 67


1. Concern with improvements that will lead more traffic to use Harrington Rd (southbound). Concern is that there might be a fatal flaw, to the south of this, where it meets Bus. 67 (O'Reilly) (especially on Alt B) b/c Harrington becomes a small 1 lane road, with no ROW access. And the American Legion and other house at this intersection are historic. Just something council member noticed and wanted us to double check. Wonder is it worth it closing this road at Bus 67? **Or is it worth turning to one-way?**



2. On Alt. C. can you turn left from Harrington? Or how do you to toward POE from Harrington?

**Alternatives at Intersection 3: O'Reilly St & Erma Ave**

- 1. They comment that a very QUICK fix (short term, low cost), for current situation is adding a stop sign (red dot), at this location. So traffic from 170 can have better visibility, and less issue with drivers fast on O'Reilly.



- 2. Question...for Alternate C, what if a semi truck is trying to go from US 67, to RR (on that new road that replaced Rio Grand Rd...are those two turns adequate?
- 3. For Alt A and B, city noted that vacant area to right of Rio Grande (that rd to RR) is owned by city so that road/entrance can be expanded if needed.
- 4. Note that there is a current business (a car sales lot, small one) close to where that red lot is. Consideration for alternative C, where that road is closed.
- 5. For Alt A, what are the white angled areas, radiated from stop intersection?
- 6. For Alt B, are those white areas ped. Crossing across hwy?
- 7. For Alt B, how does someone coming from East (say schools), and wants to turn left to access road to RR? How do they do that?
- 8. Alt C is better aesthetically and easy to understand (general comment).

#### **Alternatives at Intersection 4: FM 170, Utopia Road at US 67**

1. Big consideration here is the reduction of speed coming down the hill. Easy, quick fix. Several ppl take Utopia road (enter or exit) and they have to be extremely careful b/c of vehicles driving so fast coming into Presidio.
2. For ALL Alternative..does design have to include opening of 170 (old 170). That is old 170 rd so not sure why lane turning right for example, going n on 67 coming from bridge, are needed. That might confuse ppl...making them think. They are reopening 170 after the 67/170 intersection?
3. For Alt 4, given comment above, don't need 4 way intersection (call it diff).
4. Consideration, that there might be new 'horse hotel' near that intersection. That brown vacant lot.
5. For Alt A and B...can Trucks, leaving 170 to turn left, toward US 67 North, make turn easy, with current left turn configuration? Is radius ok there? Especially with islands?
6. For Alt C, can you make image with red line show 4 lane highway all way to 203/old 67/top of hill?
7. Maybe: [not sure if this comment was made for this intersection] For Alt. B-can triangle go away? ....
8. For Alt B, are both islands needed? I think concern was truck turning, leaving industrial park from 170 to get onto 67
9. Alt C was num. 1 priority, for this.

#### **POE Congestion Relief Concepts**

1. Alternative A. Parking Capacity at POE slide...can that lot have the blue and red lines? If too hard to add, can image just be inserted from blue lot from before, and put in here as a transition click after this slide. So as to explain the swerving in and out and access for big trucks.
2. Include possible area for rest/play so as you wait, kids/parents can have access to play area
3. For future reference, city expressed that if there is parking lot idea implemented, and txdot builds, city can operate. Especially as a REUSE area...to be used by food trucks, farmers market, food trucks, and/or shopping/garage sales. Or for long term parking too, like airports.
4. Can you include approx. number of cars, in addition to 4 miles?
5. For alternative B, is there a reason why parking lot wasn't included here? Or should it? At least say Parking Lot Optional? Alt C says no parking lot needed.
